Curriculum Structure

STAGE 5 Years 9 & 10

In Stage 5 (Years 9 & 10) all students follow differentiated courses of study for the core subjects English Mathematics HSIE Science PDHPE as they. These may include extension, all learning outcomes, reduced outcomes or lifeskills pathways. Students have a choice of 2 electives from an area of interest. Some electives are linked to TAFE certificate qualifications as students start to explore different pathways. Students also complete Careers education. Most students need to attain minimum standards in literacy and numeracy in Year 10 in preparation for the HSC. This represents the first formal qualifications that students can attain move in addition to the completion of their Record of School Achievement at the end of Year 10. Students will also be able to access short courses resulting in qualifications such as White Card and Barista training in Year 10.

STAGE 6 Years 11 &12

STAGE 6 Years 11 &12 Students must study 2 units of English and may select a range of pathways resulting in different patterns of study. Students select from a range of subjects while they are in Year 10 in preparation for completing the HSC qualification in Years 11 & 12. (The line structure is subject to change) in response to the year group selections and preferences.

These include:

- an ATAR pathway which aims to develop student readiness for tertiary study at university level
- a vocational pathway which may include a range of non-ATAR, ATAR and TAFE qualifications
- a non-ATAR pathway which prepares students for vocational pursuits or TAFE study.
- a school based apprenticeship combining work with an approved employer and a selection of ATAR and/or non-ATAR subjects.
- a vocational pathway which may include a range of non-ATAR and lifeskills qualifications.



School Uniform

The wearing of our school uniform is compulsory. The school uniform was decided on by members of the school community. The School Bytes parent portal enables you to view all your children in one portal and process payments for multiple siblings in one transaction.

IMPORTANT: To ensure that the registration process works smoothly and you can link your account to your child(ren), make sure that you use the same email address that you have provided to the school or if using a different email address, an SMS verification code will be sent to the mobile phone number on record for you at the school.

To set up your parent portal, follow the steps below:

- 3. Enter your first name as it appears on your student's profile at the school.

- 7. Select search. If all student information matches with parent information according to the student's official enrolment stored at the school, the system will add the student to the parent account automatically.

Parents & Citizens' Association

All parents/carers are encouraged to attend. It is a good way of getting to know the school and its operation and will ultimately be of benefit to your child/children. P&C Canteen

The Canteen is operated by our P&C. Steps to get started: Go to www.spriggyschools.com.au to register and download the app. Add a profile for each of your children, making sure you select VINCENTIA HIGH SCHOOL and your child's class. Start placing orders! You can place orders up to 1 week in advance AND UNTIL 8.30AM ON THE DAY OF ORDER.

All parents are invited to join the band of volunteers at the Canteen. This could involve one day a month from 7.30am to 1.30pm. If you can assist, please contact our canteen Manager Anna Butler, during school hours on 4441 6766.

Travel

All buses serving the school are chartered school buses.

- Bus travel is free to students who reside more than 2.0 kilometres (radial distance) from the school they are attending.
- The pass is only available between home and the school for school attendance and is available on school days (Monday to Friday) only for travel commencing between 6.30 am and 7.00 pm.
- ●In a joint/dual custody situation, a student is eligible for subsidised travel from both the parents' addresses subject to meeting the normal eligibility criteria.
- \bullet Bus applications are available on line at transportnsw.info/school-students
- The front office will notify students when the passes arrive at school.

Attendance

Why must I send my child to school?

The law in NSW (Education Act 1990) states that all children between the ages of six and seventeen years are required to attend school on a regular basis. It is the responsibility of parents or caregivers to make sure that their children attend school every day.

Must I send my child to school every day? YES unless:

• Your child is too sick to go, has an injury, or has an infectious illness, for example – chickenpox,

mumps or measles,

- Your child has to attend a special religious ceremony,
- ●There is a serious family situation which requires their involvement.

Why is regular attendance at school important?

Attending school every day makes learning easier for your child and helps build and maintain friendships with other children. Regular attendance at school will help your child to succeed in later life. Please do not keep your child away from school for things such as birthdays, minding other children, haircuts and shopping. Always try to make children's appointments with people like dentists or doctors before or afterschool.



Explanation of Absences

What should I do if my child has to stay away from school?

It is important to let the school know when your child will be away and why your child was absent. The parent or caregiver should telephone the school explaining the child's absence. A daily email is sent to parents whose student has been marked absent without explanation at roll call. Please reply to the email or call the school.

My child won't go to school, what should I do?

You should contact the Year Advisor or Deputy Principal Support & Wellbeing as soon as possible to discuss the problem and ask for help. The Deputy Principal may ask a Home School Liaison Officer to contact you to discuss the issue.

The role of the Home School Liaison Officer - Parents have the responsibility of ensuring the regular attendance of their children at school. Home School Liaison Officers provide additional support to students, parents and schools to encourage the full participation of all students in schooling.

Studying Science will help students gain a greater understanding of the physical and natural processes within the world in which they live. Students gain the necessary skills to study Science at a senior level through developing scientific thinking and problem-solving strategies. Many students who have undertaken studies in Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Earth and Environmental Science, Agriculture, Investigating Science and Extension Science have achieved outstanding course results and ATARs. This has allowed them to gain access to excellent university courses and successful careers in scientific fields.

Human Society & Its Environment (HSIE)

HSIE is a dynamic faculty dedicated to providing enhanced learning experiences covering all aspects of Geography and History. Students learn about the world wars and study local geographical areas both providing unique learning experiences. Other topics include archaeology, colonisation, Ancient China, Ancient Egypt, Vikings, global connections/technology, coastal landscapes, geomorphic hazards, places and liveability plus much more. As students move through their school years, they will study a wider variety of subjects including Commerce and Elective History.

CAPA

Our well established CAPA department provides introductory courses in Visual Arts and Music to all Stage 4 students. Students in Visual Arts study a broad range of styles and gain practical experience with a variety of art making materials. In addition, students can take part in many art competitions and exhibitions. Music students gain knowledge in a range of styles as well as practical experience with many instruments. All students are invited to join extension programs including music ensembles. Elective courses are offered in Stages 5 and 6. Creative & Performing Arts students have many performance opportunities at VHS, including our end of year finale 'Showcase' and exhibitions.

Technical Applied Science (TAS)

Over the course of Year 7 and 8, students will rotate through the many subject areas found in the TAS Faculty. They will take part in exciting lessons in cooking, woodwork, metalwork, electronics, computers, textiles and more. Our aim is for our students to experience as much "hands on" learning as possible, whilst integrating a range of technology. Students have at their disposal, cutting edge CAD software, a CNC plasma cutter, CNC router, Lego robotics, laser cutter/engraver, dye sublimation printer, embroidery machines and several 3D Printers allowing us to deliver STEM based content.

Sport

Vincentia High students in Year 7-10 participate in regular sport on a weekly basis in a variety of activities including ball, court, and field sports. The school athletics, swimming and cross-country carnivals are held in Terms 1 & 2 of each year and involve all students. Students also can extend themselves in sports such as dance, mountain biking and triathlon. Representative sport teams & invididual sport may include soccer, rugby, rugby league, touch football, AFL, volleyball, netball, basketball, tennis, water polo, cricket, gymnastics, diving, softball, hockey, bowls, table tennis, surfing & squash. Students can progress through school, zone, regional, state, and national competitions.

Personal Development/ Health & Physical Education (PDHPE)

PDHPE contributes significantly to the cognitive, social, emotional, physical, and spiritual development of students. We represent a broad view of health and physical activity and the many possible contexts in which individuals can build activity into their lifestyle. PDHPE incorporates a wide range of lifelong physical activities including recreational, leisure and adventure pursuits, competitive and noncompetitive games, dance plus individual and group physical fitness activities. Health areas include positive lifestyle choices, nutrition, respectful relationships, optimal mental health, and safe living. The development of lifelong skills in PDHPE is central to our philosophy. This includes:

Movement Skills - Fundamental and specialised movement skills and concepts. Tactical and creative movement. Health and fitness enhancing movement. Interpersonal Skills - Communication Collaboration, inclusion, and relationship-building. Empathy building. Leadership and advocacy social awareness. Self-Management Skills - Strengthening personal identity. Self-awareness. Emotion and stress management. Decision-making and problem-solving. Help-seeking.

The Gumbari unit's goal is to connect its students to a fun, active and caring learning space where students are encouraged to be courageous learners, developing important life skills to achieve their personal goals. The individual talents and interests of the students are celebrated and explored to develop student confidence and self-esteem. Gumbari aims to make school a positive and meaningful experience for its students to engage them in their learning and provide them with the appropriate skills, knowledge, and attitudes to enable them to transition into the workforce and community to achieve their full potential.

Students with a diverse range of learning needs are supported by the collaborative efforts of staff, outside agencies, parents/carers, and the wider community. Together we facilitate individualised planning and implementation of a vast range of academic, vocational, recreational, and social programs. Students can undertake a special program of study following the Mainstream and/or Life Skills syllabus; or alternatively accessing a combination of mainstream and support classes.

Learning and Support Program (LaSP)

LaSP is a highly visible and valued Learning and Support Program operating from our Learning and Support Education Room (LASER) in A Block. The friendly staff of Learning and Support teachers and Student Learning Support Officers (SLSOs) welcome students from Years 7 to 12 and provide direct and timely specialist assistance in regular classes with additional support needs. This includes dhugan, LIFT, tutorial support, individual learning programs, assessment tasks, literacy and numeracy programs, in-class support, teacher support and during exam periods. The LaSP Program, through the school's Learning and Support Team, prioritises support based on student learning and safety, the School Strategic Plan, and integration funding allocation.

Aboriginal Education is an important part of Vincentia High School. Our Indigenous students enjoy a wide range of cultural programs and activities. The ganya garindja (Shelter for Youth) room is our Aboriginal learning hub where students receive assistance from qualified tutors and teachers. ganya garindja also houses our Indigenous programs including dhaawarri dance and the dhurga language program, and the garindja barra barra bagan ranger program.

dhurga (Aboriginal Languages)

The program implements quality teaching and learning to enrich, extend and engage all students to complete the Stage 4 dhurga course.

Clontarf Academy

Clontarf provides full time mentoring and support to young Aboriginal men throughout their high school years and assists them with their transition to further training or employment. The mentors counsel students on a range of behavioural and lifestyle issues whilst the school caters for their educational needs. Using a comprehensive approach of supportive relationships, a welcoming environment, and a diverse range of activities, the students develop improved self-esteem and confidence. The Foundation's approach has been highly successful, not only in encouraging young men to attend school and stay at school, but also in having them embrace more disciplined, purposeful, and healthy lifestyles, developing them into respectable young men.

Library

The library supports teaching and learning at the school and is a busy and dynamic learning space throughout the day. It is open to students before school, recess and lunch for individual research and borrowing. The library has an extensive collection of youth fiction sorted into themes: suspense, mystery, action, crime and dystopian future, love, laugh and cry, fantasy, supernatural, science fiction, horror, and graphic novels, and is regularly updated with new release titles. Vincentia High School has timetabled library lessons for all Year 7 & 8 classes, once per fortnight. These lessons focus on Literacy, Reading and IT Skills that assist students with their studies across all faculties.

Defence School Mentor Program

Vincentia High School receives funding through the Defence School Mentor Program to employ a Defence School Mentor (DSM). The role of a DSM is to provide specific support and information to Defence students and their families, particularly when transitioning into a new school and during parental absence due to military service.

SEL (Social & Emotional Learning)

Students in Years 7 & 8 will be provided with the opportunity to enhance their social and emotional development. These lessons provide students opportunities to acquire and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set, and achieve positive goals, feel, and show empathy for others, establish, and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. Wellbeing programs are one of the most successful interventions to promote the positive development of students with research findings supporting students' academic achievement and positive social behaviour while reducing their conduct problems and emotional distress.

Wellbeing **yiliga-miraral** (happy spirit) is the dhurga name for our ever-expanding Wellbeing team including Head Teacher Wellbeing, Year Advisors, School Psychologists, Wellbeing Officers, Wellbeing Teacher, Student Support Officer, WHIN (Wellbeing Health in Reach Nurse) and Chaplain. Our Advisory Board meets each term to consider the emerging needs of our students and the best progress to meet these needs.

The **yiliga-miraral** team has developed numerous programs and spaces to support students within A Block and the school.

These include:

djarambu-ngarn

(quiet place)

Found on the ground floor of A Block, provides a space for students with support of our Wellbeing Staff.

djamanj-ngarn

(yarning place)

On the ground floor of A Block, a space for consultations and a private space for mediations.

djamaga ngarn

(good place)

Located on the top floor of A Block, this is a great place to facilitate groups such as Body Kind and Seasons For Growth.

walawaani-ngarn

(welcome place)

Is a purpose-built school community wellbeing hub for visiting agencies, workshops, meetings and much more. It is a safe place for students to seel support and be connected in with external agencies.

Body image is a combination of the thoughts and feelings that you have about your body and impacts how we relate to others and the world around us. Free to be me supports students to reflect on those thoughts and feelings.

Run Beyond

Success isn't just crossing the finish line.
That's just the start! Students commit to
giving up their own time to complete this
program and they work towards the
completion of a Goal Race of between
10km and a half-marathon in length.

Active Boys

High intensity exercise for 20 minutes in the middle of the day. Aims to increase blood flow to the brain and therefore improve concentration, allowing a greater focus on learning.

This program is for boys presenting with ADHD type behaviours ie. trouble focussing in class, easily distracted and lots of energy to burn.

Seasons for growth

Supporting young people to understand and respond to the issues experienced associated with death, divorce, diagnosis or significant change and loss.

Brave

An online program developed by The University of Queensland that uses CBT for Low level intervention for students experiencing anxiety, worry and fears. This is a program for young people of any age.

Wellbeing Programs

Run by external organisations supported by VHS staff

PCYC- Fit for Life:

This program focuses on linking physical, emotional & social wellbeing, nutrition and building resilience skills. Fit for life aims to improve overall wellbeing, promote a healthy lifestyle and divert youth from offending behaviours.

Vouth Insparch

This is a peer-facilitated program helping students build the necessary skills to enable them to navigate their transition to high school, remain engaged in their learning and have the confidence to develop healthy peer relationships. Youth Insearch can support young people with mental health concerns.

DDLIMBEAT

This program is a therapeutic program using rhythm which engages young people who may be at risk of problematic health and social outcomes due to emotional and social issues.

Top Blokes

Focuses on mental health, leadership, and positive decision-making for boys. Working to create a community where every young man is equipped to lead a life of purpose, empathy, and strength, and where the definition of masculinity extends far beyond the stereotype.

Perfect Presence

This program is for students with multiple suspensions, and low attendance. Each intake is 10 students and lasts a semester (alternating genders) . The program is delivered by Kiama Community College.

Acknowledgement System Eagle Merits

Eagle Merits are presented to students who embrace the value of **Respect**, **Responsibility and Personal Best**.

The Eagle Merit System is a positive rewards system that aims to recognise students who consistently display one or more of the school's core values:

RESPECT - RESPONSIBILITY - PERSONAL BEST during class time, in the playground, at school & community events and excursions.

All staff including non-teaching staff, office and canteen can give out an Eagle Merits.

GOLD SILVER BRONZE & PLATINUM awards will be accumulated and recognised during our formal school presentation assemblies to students.

Behaviour code for students

Information for students and parents or carers

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive, and responsive learning environments for everyone across a range of settings. We teach and model the inclusive and safe behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schools students are expected, to the best of their ability, to:

- show respect to other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- directions of their teachers
 strive for the highest standards in learning
- act in a courteous and respectful way that makes all members of the school community feel valued, included and supported
- resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- meet the school's agreed uniform policy or dress code
- attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- respect all property
- be safe and not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol, vapes, e-cigarettes or tobacco into our schools
- not bully, harass, intimidate, or discriminate against anyone in our schools.

Schools take action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high-quality teaching and learning.

All students have a right to:

- safety at school
- · access and fully participate in their learning
- be treated with respect by other students, teachers and school staff
- express their views, set goals and selfadvocate.

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments and apply an appropriate action when students are not meeting these expectations. The department is responsible for the provision of a policy framework and resources such as legal issues bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context, the NSW

Government and the Department of Education will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.

Behaviour code for students: Student actions

Promoting the inclusion, learning, wellbeing, and safety of all students in NSW public schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches across a range of settings to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour

To meet the expectations set out above, students in NSW public schools, to the best of their ability, should adhere to the following principles.

Respect

- · Treat one another with dignity.
- Communicate and behave courteously.
- Act and work cooperatively with other students, teachers, and school staff.
- · Develop positive and respectful relationships.
- Value the interests, ability and culture of others.
- Respect the learning needs of other students.
- Dress appropriately by wearing the agreed school uniform or dress code.
- Take care with school property and the property of staff and other students.

Safety

- Model and follow school and class rules and expectations around behaviour and conduct.
- Negotiate and resolve conflict.
- Be aware of and take responsibility for how their behaviour and actions impact others.
- Care for self and others.
- Be safe and help others to make safe choices that do not hurt themselves or others.

Engagement

- · Arrive at school and class on time.
- Be prepared for every lesson.
- Actively participate in learning.
- Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning.


